Ordinary Gratitude

I've had a really busy few months. Mostly that's not been because of church stuff, although I've been busy with that as well. Outside of work, it's been trips to Chicago for baseball and visiting our kids. It's been a little get-away to the Kansas City area. We went to Santa Fe for a National Guard conference, and I went to Idaho for a conference for Nebraska Lutheran Outdoor Ministries.

I got Covid and a weird cardiac complication put me in the hospital. (It has completely resolved by the way.) I trained for a big triathlon that I couldn't do because of Covid.

We went to the Czech Republic with our kids for a twice delayed but amazing family vacation. And when I got back I ran the Good Life Halfsy half-marathon. Half-marathon training is maybe not quite as time-consuming as triathlon training, but it's still a lot.

I've also chaired a committee working to fund a new Aquatic Center in Waverly. Ground has finally been broken culminating a four-year stretch of hard work.

But now, the big things I had on my calendar are over. I always have a bit of a letdown feeling at the end of a big trip and at the end of race season. With everything that's been on my calendar even just in the last six weeks, it's been a double whammy.

And fall often brings on a bit of a melancholy feeling just on its own. The garden is done. The weather is cooling and sitting on the patio in the evenings is less comfortable. In fact, there have been times in my life when I've had actual depression triggered by that feeling of things coming to an end.

For some people, it's easy to start ramping up for the holidays...to get busy with decorating and shopping and maybe making travel plans. But if nature takes some time to rest, maybe we ought to take our cue from that.

The single most helpful thing I've found to manage some of the blues this time of year can bring is to focus on gratitude. And not really even so much gratitude for the great big things. I'm ever so grateful for family, friends, all the people in my life, and of course Jesus who is the source of all life, death, and rebirth. I'm grateful for the ability to travel and do crazy stuff like triathlons and a half-marathon.

But what I find helpful right now is the practice of gratitude for the very simple, ordinary things in my life. And my practice is to take a picture of those things. I'm more likely to be accountable to the process if I post those to my social media pages, but of course that's not necessary.
